NATIONAL NEWS University of Michigan Study Reveals Women Going Bankrupt from Breast Cancer.

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A new research finds that women are going broke to pay for their breast cancer treatment.

In 2015, Pink Aid launched Pink Aid's Pink Purse emergency fund, as through our grant work we recognized a growing trend of families falling into financial crisis while heads of households were in treatment.

The national realities of this trend were confirmed by a recent study in which the University of Michigan Rogel Cancer Center found families. It is our hope that in the coming years, that 38% of breast cancer patients are terrified about the financial prospect of facing the disease

Researchers surveyed 2,500 patients treated for early-stage breast cancer, as well as 845 breast surgeons, medical oncologists and radiation oncologists. The results were published in CANCER, a journal of the American Cancer Society.

With all the advances in recent decades, treatment for early-stage breast cancer is more effective than ever. However, the study found that the financial ramifications of the disease can be dire. That's partly because insurance doesn't cover as much of the costs: 17% of patients spent more than 10% of their household income on out-ofpocket medical expenses related to treatment. Even many insured are in trouble when these costs are added to missed time from work. For the uninsured. it's worse.

Researchers found that African-Americans and Latinas had the most fears, including losing their homes, having their utilities shut off and cutting back on food because of treatment expenses.

While Pink Aid does not directly pay for medical expenses, we try to ease the burden for these families as much as we can. Through Pink Purse, we work directly with nurse navigators who identitfy patients who are struggling and seek help on their behalf.

Throughout Connecticut and Long Island, Pink Purse provides emergency funding to approximatly fifty patients each month to help take care of their Pink Aid can bring Pink Purse to many more areas with communities in need.
